




Program Demographic Profile - Adult Only Households (Households w/o Minor Children)







- Since 1982, Rainbow Place Shelter has been a seasonal overnight shelter in Rockville serving adult women of all ages who are experiencing homelessness. The current mission of Rainbow Place is to provide women emergency overnight shelter during the hypothermia season and assist them as they transition to a better quality of life

- We should care about homelessness because it is a problem that affects us all. First, it is a human rights issue.
- In 2012, Shaun Donovan, the secretary of the U.S. Housing and Urban Development Department (HUD) stated that, "...between shelters and emergency rooms and jails, it costs about \$40,000 a year for a homeless person to be on the streets.
- Homelessness isn't someone else's issue. It has a ripple effect throughout the community. It impacts the availability of healthcare resources, crime and safety, the workforce, and the use of tax dollars.
- The causes of homelessness vary and include substance abuse, violence in the home, and loss of income. Homelessness is a problem for individuals and communities alike. Some of the effects of homelessness can include poor health conditions, low self-esteem, and strain on the community.
- Researchers have estimated unemployment rates among people experiencing homelessness ranging from 57% to over 90% compared to 3.6% for the general United States population.

- Rainbow Place Shelter is currently in the exciting process of expanding and shifting Rainbow's missing to focus on young adults 18-24 years of age, including the LGBTQ+ community, with year-round, 24-hour emergency shelter and the support needed to transition out of homelessness.
- Youth Housing Instability is an issue that hides in plain sight.
  Unlike chronic, transient or episodic homelessness, Housing instability amongst young adults, ages 18-24, can be categorized as "hidden homelessness".
- These individuals are not readily identified because of the stigma associated with this circumstance. Due to this they are often "hidden" from national statistics on homelessness. The "hidden homeless" population tends to skew younger and more specifically toward young adults.
- LGBTQ youth had a 120% higher risk of reporting homelessness. 29% of youth were reported as having substance use problems. 69% of youth indicated having mental health difficulties.

#### Remedies



• The shelter will prevent the loss of property value as a result of vagrancy, and the loss of customers and client's patronage at businesses. The shelter will cultivate skills by way of workforce development and education.

• Those experiencing this are often victims of crime and some are incentivized to commit crimes to improve their station. Our services will mitigate law enforcement intervention.

 By decreasing crime, improving health and fostering personal growth, this initiative will save taxpayers money.
